All Saints' Day - November 1

Bill Oldland's History Lesson

A major feast day, All Saints' Day celebrates the lives of all known and unknown Christian Saints. The earliest reference to this feast is in the writings of St. Ephrem Syrus who died in 373.

St. Chrysostom, who died in 407, also recorded that the feast had been assigned a specific day in the church year—the first Sunday after Pentecost. This is when the Eastern churches, Russian Orthodox, and Eastern Orthodox celebrate it.



Western churches celebrate on November first because Gregory III began this tradition by dedicating a chapel in the Basilica of St. Peter to All Saints' on that day.

We will celebrate All Saints' Day with two special services:

?? **Friday, Nov. 1 at 7:00 p.m. Zion Baptist Church** - combined choirs from both churches will provide the music for worship; Rev. Patrick Cheston will officiate and Rev. Bill Oldland will preach the sermon

Giannini Brass on All Saints' Sunday

The Giannini Brass was formed in 1989 by alumni of the North Carolina School of the Arts (NCSA). The group was named after Vittorio Giannini, American composer

and educator, who founded NCSA.

Currently, members of the Giannini Brass perform in nearly all of the professional orchestras in the Carolinas, and have toured and performed with

orchestras and chamber music ensembles throughout the United States and Europe. The Giannini Brass performs in a variety of unusual and interesting performance settings, including multi-media planetarium concerts, with symphony orchestras, and on radio and television stations.

The Giannini Brass have collaborated with Charles Vernon, bass trombonist of the Chicago Symphony, and Sam Pilafian, founding member of the Empire Brass, and currently Travelin' Light. Since 1999-2000, the Giannini Brass have been artists-in-residence at Classical WDAV 89.9, the fine arts radio station for Charlotte, and surrounding areas. The Giannini Brass is a Yamaha performing ensemble.

How I Came to Visit Ground Zero

Sometimes things happen that lead to other things, and later, you look back and think, "Wow! All these things fell into place and look where I am."

Well, that's what happened to me.

One minute, I was going to the National Happening Leadership Conference in Pennsylvania in July, with 3 other adults and 8 high school students. And the next minute, I was at Ground Zero in New York City on October 5 - a moment I will never forget.

Yes, some things happened between these events. During our three days at the NHLC in Wilkes-Barre, PA, I felt led to apply and be interviewed to be on the Happening National Committee (HNC). So, I did!

This committee meets twice a year in various locations in the U.S. It oversees Happening, A Christian Experience and plans the biannual NHLC.

Made up of 11 people, the committee includes: 2 clergy, 3 lay adults, and 6 youth. All are from all over the country.

To make a long story shorter, I somehow was elected to be on the committee and I was VERY excited!

The first meeting was in Cherry Hill, NJ October-3-6 at St. Luke's Episcopal Church. We all flew into "Philly" and were taken to homes in the community. During the weekend, we met at the church, worked on evaluations from the July NHLC, the Quality Control Manual for Happening, the national newsletter and website, and lots of other stuff. We finished our work by early Saturday afternoon.

It was decided that the group would ride the train into "the city." We arrived at Penn Station and took the subway to the General Episcopal Seminary in order to meet our Executive Director, Charlie Deaton, whose wife is a student there. We took another subway to the site of the World Trade Center.

Together and in silence, our group



walked around the large fenced area of Ground Zero. It was a profound, surreal, emotional experience that we shared with hundreds of other silent people walking around the site. A powerful symbol was found at the bottom of the rubble. It has been mounted—just as it was found—two steel beams creating a cross.

Not far from this cross, our group formed a silent circle and held hands. With tears streaming down our faces and voices breaking, we recited the 23rd Psalm and the Prayer of St. Francis. Rev. Harry Grace of NY said a prayer, asking for peace.

There really are no words to describe this moment—I stood there representing Happening in the Diocese of NC. And our small group stood there for each of the Happenings across the country. . . NC beside California beside NY beside Maine beside Pennsylvania beside Florida beside Texas beside Indiana beside Mississippi beside Oklahoma beside Georgia beside NJ. . .
