

From the Rector's Desk - The Rev. William D. Oldland

Tom Balsley's Thoughts on Stewardship

If someone were to ask me to name the gifts in my life I value most, I would answer, "family and friends." However, these are treasures I tend to take for granted, especially if my life is going well. As for family, I am linked to certain people and they have to put up with me in spite of my worst moments. Even in the poem, "Death of the Hired Man," Robert Frost says, "Home is the place where, when you have to go there, they have to take you in."



Friends are the people we have chosen to be our companions. At the same time these people have, to a great extent, chosen us. We have old friends we grew up with, new friends, church friends, work friends, social friends, and even family members who are our good friends.

For all of us, these people are important. Two individuals who mean a great deal to me are John and Alice, two of my associates at work. Like me, they are both Human Re-

source Managers with the company for which we are employed. On the surface they appear to be quite average and ordinary. However, like anyone else, there are many aspects of their lives that make them special. John's wife works at one of our plants. He has two children; a daughter who got married a short time ago and a son who just completed his duty in the

Marines. John seems to call whenever I need a "pick-up" in the day. He has such a positive attitude and it seems to rub off on those around him. One aspect of John I admire is that he kept his grandmother in his home for about 10 years prior to her death – a real labor of love. He talks unashamedly about his faith and never fails to say grace before a meal – and it doesn't matter where we are.

Alice and I have known each other for about 30 years. We have watched our children grow to adulthood and have shared in their ups and downs. Alice has seen a young granddaughter die and

is now worried about her oldest daughter who not long ago learned she has cancer. She is a faithful member of her church choir and also sings in a gospel group. Although her life has had its tragic moments, she is an upbeat person and is always a good listener.

I feel so fortunate to have these two persons in my life. Not only have they helped me solve problems at work but they have been spiritual anchors for me as well. They have made my life richer for having known them.

As believers in Christ, it is our duty to encourage and inspire those around us. However, from time to time, we may need to ask ourselves, "What value do we add to the lives of those who are important to us – our family and friends?" Hopefully we are able to contribute something of lasting significance to those people we love and cherish.
